**CITY COUNCIL
SPECIAL SESSION/CLOSED SESSION**

The Woodland City Council met in special session at 6:00 p.m. in the second floor conference room of City Hall in order to convene a closed session. Before the closed session the Mayor announced the closed session topics.

The Council then convened a closed session for a conference with Labor Negotiator (the City represented by Assistant City Manager Phil Marler and the City's Labor Negotiator William Avery) regarding the following employee organizations: Woodland Professional Police Employees' Association, Woodland Police Supervisors' Association, and Woodland City Employees' Association (Sec. 54957). The Council then held a conference with legal counsel regarding existing litigation (Sec. 54956.9(a): City of Woodland v. Walgreen (nuisance abatement). A second conference with legal counsel was held regarding existing litigation (Sec. 54956.9(a): Citizens for Responsible Mining v. State Water Resources Control Board and County of Yolo (99-CF01395).

Council Members present at the special meeting were: Losoya, Borchard, Flory, Peart and Ryhal. Council Members absent: None. City Manager Richard Kirkwood and Assistant City Manager Phillip Marler were also present for the closed session.

The special session and closed session were adjourned at 6:50 p.m.

**CITY COUNCIL
REGULAR SESSION**

CLOSED SESSION ANNOUNCEMENT:

Mayor Losoya advised that no Council action was taken during the closed session held at 6:00 p.m. tonight regarding the conference with the City's Labor Negotiator concerning the Woodland Professional Police Employees'

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Association, Woodland Police Supervisors' Association, and Woodland City Employees' Association. He said Council gave direction for negotiators to proceed. Regarding the closed session conferences with legal counsel on existing litigation the Council gave legal counsel direction to proceed in the matter of the City v. Walgreen.

City Attorney Ann Siprelle said in the matter of Citizens for Responsible Mining v. the State Water Resources Control Board and County of Yolo the City Attorney was directed to take action to intervene or file an amicus or friend of the court brief to assist the County of Yolo and the State Water Resources Control Board.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE:

Mayor Losoya convened the regular meeting at 7:00 p.m. and invited everyone present to join him in the pledge of allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America.

MOMENT OF SILENCE FOR SACRAMENTO MAYOR JOE SERNA:

Mayor Losoya asked for a moment of silence in honor of Sacramento Mayor Joe Serna who passed away.

MINUTES:

On motion of Vice Mayor Borchard, seconded by Council Member Peart and carried by unanimous vote, the City Council approved the minutes of the regular Council meeting of September 21, 1999, as prepared.

WRITTEN COMMUNICATIONS:

1. From Janet Levers a letter was received urging the Council to consider wetlands as a method of treating the City's wastewater.

2. From the State Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control a copy of an application was received for an off sale general alcoholic beverage license for Economy Food Store, 7 West Court Street. Council also received a copy of a letter from Police Chief Del Hanson to Associate Planner Ron Pinegar protesting the issuance of a Public Convenience or Necessity (PCN) letter for the store.

3. From the State Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control a copy of an application was received for an on sale beer and wine license for Gelt Holdings, Inc., 120 Main Street (Woodland Shopping Center). The Police Department had advised that they have no objections to the issuance of this license.

4. From Woodmark Apartment Associates Limited Partnership a claim and an amended claim against the City were received regarding City fees paid in connection with their apartment project in Woodland. The City Attorney recommended that the Council reject the claims and refer them to the City's insurance representative, Jeff Tonks of Yolo County Public Agency Risk Management Insurance Authority.

On motion of Council Member Borchard, seconded by Council Member Peart and carried by unanimous vote, the City Council rejected the claim and amended claim against the City submitted on behalf of Woodmark Apartment Associates Limited Partnership and referred the claims to the City's insurance representative.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

1. From Police Chief Del Hanson a report was received transmitting the minutes of the Yolo County Communications Emergency Services Agency Board meeting of October 6, 1999.

2. From Library Services Director Marie Bryan a report was received transmitting the minutes of the Library Board of Trustees meeting of October 18, 1999.

Vice Mayor Borchard inquired about the interview process for Librarian. He noted that the minutes indicated that the unanimous choice of the interviewers was not able to work until January. He asked if a deadline was set for filing applications for the position, and he felt it is important to adhere to the deadlines.

The City Manager said the Library Services Director indicated that the particular individual they were seeking possessed certain skills, and there were not those skills available in the recruitment process. He said she wanted to expand the recruitment area. He said he did not have an answer with respect to the time frame, but he will ask the Library Services Director and how that relates to the Council's expectation that we would have the ability to open our Library doors much sooner. He said he will get answers on that issue.

Vice Mayor Borchard also asked about establishing a deadline or ending recruitment and then reopening the recruitment.

Assistant City Manager Phil Marler said his assumption from the Library Board minutes is that the one candidate, who was clearly "head and shoulders" above the other candidates, was not available until January, so they were conducting a two-track recruitment system.

The City Manager said he will pose the question to the Library Services Director and have her issue a memorandum to the Council.

3. From Parks, Recreation and Community Services Director Henry Agonia a report was received summarizing action taken at the Parks, Recreation and Community Services Commission meeting of October 25, 1999.

4. From Finance Director Margaret Vicars a report was received transmitting the minutes of the Yolo County Public Agency Risk Management Insurance Authority Board meeting of October 27, 1999.

5. From Public Works Director Gary Wegener a report was received transmitting the minutes of the Traffic Safety Commission meeting of November 1, 1999.

Vice Mayor Borchard said since there was a recent tragic traffic accident at the corner of East Gum Avenue and Pioneer Avenue, he wondered if the Traffic Safety Commission will discuss increasing the traffic

controlling facilities at that location. He asked if the accident, which killed two people, was the result of the intersection.

Police Chief Del Hanson said he spoke with Sergeant George Bierwirth on two separate occasions to get updates on the traffic accident investigation, and he was told that the intersection played no role in the accident itself.

Council Member Peart said he received two calls about the issue, and he suggested that they write a letter and submit it to the Council or the Traffic Safety Commission.

The Public Works Director said with the Phase 2 improvements in the Community Facilities District the construction of Pioneer Avenue will be completed with two lanes in each direction and will extend the median to the intersection. The project is slated for advertising in the Spring.

PUBLIC COMMENT:

Dudley Holman asked to speak about the Consent Calendar agenda item regarding the public hearing process for Turn of the Century.

Council Member Ryhal said he wanted to remove that item from the Consent Calendar for discussion.

COUNCIL STATEMENTS AND REQUESTS:

Council Member Ryhal said he attended a County/City 2 x 2 meeting on November 10, 1999, a meeting open to the public, during which there was discussion about the ag preservation area that has been discussed at Council meetings and elsewhere. He said County Supervisor Dave Rosenberg said he was going to have another meeting with the City of Davis, and Council Member Ryhal asked to have the City of Woodland represented at the meeting. He said unfortunately information, which appeared in the Daily Democrat, was incorrect. He said he suggested that the jurisdictions hold a 2 x 2 x 2 meeting because it is an important issue and everyone could be hearing the same information at the same time. He said the County agreed to hold the 2 x 2 x 2. He said he suggested that he and Vice Mayor Borchard attend the meeting.

The City Manager reminded the Council that on November 23, 1999, at 11:00 a.m. the City and the County will be celebrating the improvements on

Second Street for the new District Attorney's offices. The City Manager said he also received a letter with a check today from County Supervisor Tom Stallard and his wife Meg indicating their pleasure with the improvements and funds for a bench on Second Street to be dedicated to the former Interim City Manager Gerald Davis.

The City Manager also said he will contact Congressman Doug Ose to give the City a Congressional update and to express the City's appreciation for his assistance with the FEMA process in Washington, DC. He said Assemblywoman Helen Thomson could be invited also to be recognized for her efforts. He said he will try to schedule the presentations for the December 7 Council meeting.

Mayor Melton Losoya said that due to his appointment as the County's Chief Probation Officer he has decided not to seek reelection in March of 2000, when his term on the Council will be up. He then gave the press a prepared statement.

REPORT FROM WOODLAND OPERA HOUSE:

Jeff Kean, Executive Director of the Woodland Opera House, gave the Council an annual report of the Woodland Opera House past year's programs, current financial condition and future plans.

PROCLAMATION - NOVEMBER 21-27, 1999 AS "FAMILY WEEK":

On motion of Council Member Borchard, seconded by Council Member Flory and carried by unanimous vote, the City Council proclaimed November 21-27, 1999, as "Family Week" in Woodland.

Mayor Losoya presented the proclamation to Tamara Hunt, representing the Woodland Ecumenical Ministries.

PRESENTATION BY SACRAMENTO-YOLO MOSQUITO & VECTOR CONTROL DISTRICT REPRESENTATIVE:

Council heard a presentation by the City's representative on the Sacramento-Yolo Mosquito & Vector Control District, Richard Walker, regarding activities of the District throughout the County.

CONSENT CALENDAR:

Mayor Losoya said the agenda item regarding the Turn of the Century public hearings will be removed from the Consent Calendar.

Council Member Peart asked to have the following matters removed from the Consent Calendar: water tank for Public Works, Cache Creek Flood Protection Feasibility Study, and agreement with Yolo County Housing Authority regarding renovation of a youth boxing facility and tobacco/drug free youth excursions.

On motion of Council Member Borchard, seconded by Council Member Ryhal and carried by unanimous vote, the City Council approved the following Consent Calendar item:

TREASURER'S REPORT FOR SEPTEMBER 1999:

The City Council accepted the Treasurer's Investment Report for September 1999.

CACHE CREEK PROTECTION IMPROVEMENT COSTS:

The City Council authorized the solicitation of proposals for preliminary assessment engineering for the local share of Cache Creek flood protection improvement costs.

FEASIBILITY STUDY FOR FLOOD PROTECTION IMPROVEMENTS FOR CACHE CREEK:

The City Council authorized the Director of Public Works to execute a contract with MBK Engineers in an amount not to exceed \$20,000 to support and help expedite completion of the Feasibility Study for flood protection improvements for Cache Creek.

DEEP SEWER LATERAL REPAIRS:

The City Council authorized a sole source contract negotiation for the deep sewer lateral repairs (Gibson Ranch Community Facilities District No. 1, Deep Sewer Repair, Project No. 98-45).

HOMELESS COORDINATOR'S REPORTS:

The City Council received the August, September and October 1999 Homeless Coordinator's Reports.

RESOLUTION NO. 4145 - STATE FUNDED PROJECTS:

The City Council adopted Resolution No. 4145 approving the Master Agreement with the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) for State funded projects and authorized the Mayor to execute the agreement on behalf of the City of Woodland.

AGENDA ITEMS REMOVED FROM CONSENT CALENDAR:

CONSTRUCTION AND INSTALLATION OF WATER TANK FOR PUBLIC WORKS:

On motion of Council Member Peart, seconded by Council Member Borchard and carried by unanimous vote, the City Council awarded the bid for construction and installation of a fifteen hundred gallon water tank, associated pumping, piping, and ancillary equipment in the amount of \$23,513.75 to Diamond Steel Co., Inc. of Yuba City, California.

CACHE CREEK FLOOD PROTECTION FEASIBILITY STUDY:

On motion of Council Member Peart, seconded by Council Member Ryhal and carried by unanimous vote, the City Council authorized the City Manager to execute the Local Feasibility Cost-Sharing Agreement with the State Reclamation Board for the Lower Cache Creek, Yolo County, Woodland Area General Investigation Feasibility Study for flood protection on Cache Creek, and directed staff to prepare a letter to the County of Yolo requesting a partnership agreement and the County's participation in sharing the cost of the Feasibility Study.

PUBLIC HEARING PROCESS FOR TURN OF THE CENTURY:

On motion of Council Member Flory, seconded by Council Member Borchard and carried by unanimous vote, the City Council cancelled the planned November 30, 1999 special City Council hearing regarding the Turn of the Century Specific Plan and Council directed staff

and the Planning Commission to proceed with the review process as described in the staff report with the projection that the Planning Commission will conclude its review of the Plan by early December, the Plan will be revised to reflect the Commission's recommendation by early January, and the Council should be able to begin their deliberations mid-January of 2000.

YOUTH BOXING FACILITY AND TOBACCO/DRUG-FREE YOUTH EXCURSIONS:

Recreation Manager Dan Rice responded to questions from Council Member Peart regarding a possible duplication of the \$9,000 request for boxing facility renovations and youth excursions and the \$9,000 for CDBG funds. Mr. Rice said originally \$15,000 was requested in CDBG funds for the boxing ring, and with the \$30,000 requested at this time there will be a \$45,000 project to make some adjustments to the boxing facility. He said it is not a duplication.

On motion of Council Member Peart, seconded by Council Member Ryhal and carried by unanimous vote, the City Council approved an agreement with the Yolo County Housing Authority which will provide funding, in the amount of \$30,000 for the renovation of the Woodland boxing facility and for ten (10) Tobacco/Drug Free Youth Program excursions; and authorized the City Manager to execute such agreement.

PUBLIC COMMENT:

On motion of Council Member Flory, seconded by Council Member Borchard and carried by unanimous vote, the City Council reopened the public comment period.

Denia Yanka expressed a complaint about "Laid Law" (the company which operates the bus service in Woodland) and their services to the public. She said the bus drivers are very unkind to passengers. She said she was cited twice for assault on a bus driver. She said when she went to court recently the charges were dropped, but the last charge was not dropped. She said she presented her problem to Terry Bassett of Yolo County Transportation District and he did not help her but gave her a citation.

Council Member Ryhal, the current chair of the Yolo County Transportation District Board, said he has had personal conversations with Mr. Bassett and there is an ongoing investigation.

HEARING - CONSOLIDATED PLAN, 5 YEAR STRATEGY & FAIR HOUSING PLAN:

Mayor Losoya said this time was set to consider the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Consolidated Plan, the Five-Year Strategy, and the Fair Housing Plan.

Community Development Director Steve Harris said Heidi Tschudin has been contracted by the City to be the lead consultant in this process along with various City staff members, including Assistant Planner Paul Hanson. He said updating the Five Year Consolidated Plan is the first step of this project.

Paul Hanson distributed a handout of what economic development activities are eligible.

Heidi Tschudin said the staff report gave Council an overview of the CDBG program for 1998 and how the funds were expended. She said the City has received approximately \$600,000 over the past couple of years which has been allocated for a number of programs. In addition there are other grants available for housing programs which takes the full CDBG amount of over \$2.5 million. She said the staff report discusses adding economic development to those programs. She said Council is being asked to receive public comments and transmit those to staff, accept the scope of work that will lead to the update of the plan documents, and direct staff regarding the focus with respect to economic development activities. She then outlined the review process, which will end in mid-April at which time the document will be submitted to the Federal government for its review and approval process.

Mayor Losoya opened the public hearing.

The following persons offered comments: Kathy Trott, President of the Food Bank of Yolo County; Sergei Shkurkin, Yolo County Homeless Coordinator; and Bryce Birkman, Executive Director of Woodland Economic Renaissance Corporation (WERC).

Council discussion followed.

On motion of Council Member Flory, seconded by Council Member Borchard and carried by unanimous vote, the City Council accepted the staff-proposed scope of work for the update of the Consolidated Plan and provided direction regarding the focus of the CDBG program with respect to economic development and directed that the focus be that staff proceed with development of a funding program.

Council took a recess from 8:49 p.m. until 9:02 p.m.

REPORTS OF THE CITY MANAGER:

REGULAR CALENDAR:

ANIMAL KEEPING REGULATIONS:

The City Manager said staff has researched several animal keeping ordinances from various jurisdictions, and he said staff is recommending a town hall meeting to discuss the issues and from that try to develop an ordinance that meets the interests of the majority of our citizens.

Community Development Director Steve Harris briefed the Council on the research of other ordinances. He said since this is a zoning matter it should be referred back to the Planning Commission.

Associate Planner Ron Pinegar pointed out that the City has adopted the Yolo County animal control ordinance and incorporated the ordinance by reference, and the City has been using the County's ordinance in dealing with animal issues. He said the regulations, however, only pertain to dogs and does not cover the keeping of large domestic animals. The City currently does not have any ordinance dealing with large animals. He said the County has zoning regulations pertaining to larger animals, but the City has not adopted those by reference. He said the format of the ordinance from the City of Winters would be a good alternative as a starting point to deal with animal issues. He said currently complaints are referred to Animal Control and the Environmental Health, both County offices, or the Police Department if there is a noise issue. He said the City does need to get into some type of animal keeping ordinance. He said with most ordinances the minimum size for keeping large domestic animals is one acre.

Responding to a question from Council Member Flory, the City Attorney said the ordinance could provide that any nonconforming uses would have to be brought into compliance within some reasonable period of time.

Evelia Genera thanked the Community Development Director for making available the ordinances adopted by other cities. She said 20 residents in her neighborhood held a meeting to review the ordinances and they favored the Davis ordinance. She said the City needs something that is enforceable, and she said she had signatures of those in support of the Davis ordinance.

Janet Ehrke, 525 W. Keystone Avenue, said she contacted the County Health Department starting the middle of July, and no one has phoned her back. She said there were a tremendous amount of large flies and horrible smells. After two weeks she phoned back again, and was informed that the Health Department would go by the problem area. She said he indicated the property owner would clean up the area and make a compost pile with manure and straw and put it across the back of her fence. She said the fumes and flies were still terrible.

Karen Hulbert, resident of Hollister Road, expressed support for the Davis animal ordinance. She said it is a matter of a problem of a large animal being near several neighbors. She said with the Winters ordinance and the Winters setback requirements, the animals could be too close to neighboring properties.

Carol Young, resident of Third Street, said she was concerned that the new ordinance might be too broad to include all kinds of animals which people have.

Dr. Lynn Chapman, owner of the horse being discussed, said she felt saddened and disappointed that there were statements made that people have tried to talk to her and she does not answer phone calls and is not cooperative. She said that has not been the case. She said the Generas have not been to her house, and she did not know that a lot of this has been going on. She apologized. She said she moved to Woodland five years ago and joined Blevins Clinic, and her husband is the CEO of Valley Media. When they moved to town she said she contacted the City because there were four horses one-half of a block from their property on College. She said they purchased 1.3 acres of land and a

separate lot was sold. She said they called the City regarding zoning specifically about horses, and the City responded that it was okay to have a horse and there was a smell and a fly ordinance. She said they would not have purchased the property if it had not been possible to have a horse. She said they did not have the horse until last year. She said they sold the lot, and the new buyers found out that there was a sewer line running through their property, 20 feet into the property from the front to the rear end of the property.

Glenn Browning, 47 Third Street, said he was concerned that the Council not over react and pass an ordinance that is too broad and covers small animals, such as rabbits and chickens.

Council discussion followed.

The City Manager said from the consensus of the Council discussion the matter does deserve an ordinance, and he recommended that the matter be referred to the Planning Commission, ask the Commission to address the issue at their next available, establish a schedule of appropriate public hearings to consider various ordinances and alternatives, and report back to the City Council.

On motion of Council Member Flory, seconded by Council Member Ryhal and carried by unanimous vote, the City Council referred the matter of a proposed ordinance regarding the keeping of animals to the Planning Commission for review, holding of public hearings and making recommendations to Council.

CHANGES TO AREA CODE "530":

Finance Director Margaret Vicars reported that the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) has recently issued new estimates for the life of the 530 Area Code for Northern California. She said the present estimate is that Area Code 530 will run out of numbers in mid to late year 2000. A proposal has been put before the City that essentially provides for (1) splitting the current 530 area code geographic boundaries into three separate areas, or (2) instituting an 'overlay' system with either a two or three way split. An overlay would mean a next door neighbor could be in a different area code, and there could be several area codes in the same geographic area. The Finance Director said of the different

scenarios proposed by CPUC staff recommends Alternative #3B which would provide that Yolo County keeps the 530 area code for 10 years.

On motion of Council Member Peart, seconded by Council Member Flory and carried by unanimous vote, the City Council authorized the Mayor to sign a letter to the California Public Utilities Commission protesting the proposed change in the 530 Area Code and indicating the City's preference for Alternative #3B.

SIGN ORDINANCE - NONCONFORMING SIGNS AND ABATEMENT:

Community Development Director Steve Harris said the origination of a proposed amendment to the sign ordinance regarding amortization of non-conforming signs and abatement came from the Planning Commission after adoption of the Community Design Guidelines. In working with those Guidelines the Commission determined that the section relating to signs, particularly the freeway oriented signs, needed some enhancement. He said Associate Planner Ron Pinegar has worked on this issue for quite some time and the Planning Commission addressed the topic a number of times. At the last meeting the Commission discussed a number of sign related issues dealing with consistency, nonconformity, grandfathering of signs, illegal signs, the existing sign ordinance as well as the Design Guidelines, the Downtown Specific Plan and the East Street Specific Plan. From that conversation there was input from the City Attorney's office about the City's existing amortization schedule and the existing sign ordinance and how that is inconsistent with State law and how the City should bring that into consistency with State law.

Associate Planner Ron Pinegar said the Planning Commission was not happy with the Design Guidelines when they were adopted in 1995 and became effective February 21, 1998. He said the Commission wanted to bring the issue back to staff so that the Commission could look at the freeway sign guidelines. He said the Commission wanted to avoid the large steel poles with cabinets mounted on top, which is very plain in the Commission's mind and not attractive. He said the Commission wanted to develop some guidelines that would have improved sign design so that the City would have a distinctive image to go along with its historic character and heritage. He said initially the Commission was going to go with a specific plan for freeway signs to nail down a specific type of sign for clusters of property along I-5 and at the interchanges. He

said personally he has some misgivings about that because the City would be trying to predetermine what kind of businesses are going in and how many sign poles would be needed. He said the City Attorney was asked for input, and the City Attorney's office advises it would be best to revise the Guidelines further to provide the general direction and criteria within the Guidelines rather than try to get specific on an interchange by interchange basis because there were so many complicating factors involving foliage along the freeway interchange, and overcrossing heights, possible connecting ramps obstructing signs. He said Caltrans is planting oak trees all along the I-5 interchange right-of-way, so as the trees get older the signs will not be visible. He said the Commission wanted some more distinctive signs with a consistent theme. He said the Guidelines themselves address Main Street and East Street, and there is a Downtown Specific Plan and an East Street Specific Plan with specific design requirements as well. He said in 1981 - 1982 there was an amortization period to have nonconforming signs phased out, and at that time the City Council decided not to take action because it was in the midst of a recession and would be hard on the businesses involved. He said at the last meeting the Planning Commission looked at an update of a section of the sign ordinance that deals with nonconforming signs. At that time there was a lengthy discussion, and they discovered that in order for any signs that are made nonconforming by the new Freeway Design Guidelines to be abated over a period of time the existing sign ordinance would have to be amended. He said State law does stipulate that there be a 15 year amortization period.

City Attorney Ann Siprelle said the minimum amortization period is at least 15 years and more time could be given.

Mr. Pinegar said the City is also required to do an inventory of the signs, which are not in conformance. He said the City could continue to use the current sign ordinance and apply the 15-year amortization period in accordance with State law; however any signs that are nonconforming under the existing Design Guidelines or the proposed Guidelines cannot be amortized.

Council discussion followed.

Council Member Flory temporarily left the Council meeting at 10:25 p.m.

On motion of Council Member Borchard, seconded by Council Member Peart and carried by unanimous vote, the City Council extended the Council meeting from 10:30 p.m. until 11:00 p.m.

Council Member Flory returned to the Council meeting at 10:30 p.m.

On motion of Council Member Ryhal, seconded by Council Member Peart and carried by unanimous vote, the City Council authorized staff to continue working with the Planning Commission with regard to freeway signage issues and postpone consideration of the sign ordinances that deal with the Main Street and East Street areas until June 2000.

COMPLETION OF PIONEER PARK:

Pursuant to the recommendation from Public Works Director Gary Wegener the Council deferred action on the acceptance of Pioneer Park by Refnes construction, pending completion of a punch list of items. Council was advised that's the park dedication will still be held on December 18, 1999.

TESTING TO CLEAR LANDFILL FOR FUTURE USE:

On motion of Council Member Peart, seconded by Council Member Ryhal and carried by unanimous vote, the City Council authorize a contract amendment in the amount of \$16,000 to the professional services contract with EMCON-IT for testing to clear the former City Landfill (Regional Park) for future use
